Vocabulary you will know...

Law	The set of rules that people in a society must follow
Rules	A law or direction that guides behaviour or action.
Responsibility	Something for which a person is responsible
Rights	That which is due to a person from law
Consequences	Something which follows an action
Compassion	A feeling of sharing another's suffering that leads to a desire to help
Voting	The act of a group of people in which each person expresses his or her choice about something
Ballot	A piece of paper on which people who are voting enter their choices
Debate	A discussion between two people or groups who disagree on an important subject
Welfare	A state of health, happiness, and good fortune
Climate Change	Change in global climate patterns due to an increase in atmospheric carbon dioxide from the burning of fossil fuels
Wants	to desire; wish for
Needs	Something that one must have
Decisions	The act or result of making up one's mind
